Remembrance Through Music: Commemorating The Kristallnacht

The Blue Mountain Chamber Music Players will present the NJ Premiere of Two Songs by Harold Levin, written to the anonymous poems from Germany that survived the Holocaust. They were found in the family archive by the son and grandson of Holocaust survivors Mark Mayerowitz, who will tell the story of their discovery.

Also included in the program is Yizkor by Oedoen Partos, a famous Hungarian-Israeli composer and violist, who was saved from the Nazis by one of the greatest musicians of the twentieth century Bronislaw Guberman.

The program will include an introduction by Professor Stephen Bronner (Rutgers University).

Kristallnacht (Night of Broken Glass) was a Nazi government-sponsored attack on Jews and Jewish establishments in Germany and Austria on November 9 and 10, 1938. Resulting in almost 100 Jewish deaths, this tragedy is considered by many historians and educators the beginning of the Holocaust.
